Overview

The course, 'Introduction to Nigerian Government and Politics', is designed to afford the students a good knowledge of the historical evolution of the Nigerian State. It provides an opportunity for the students to understand the survey and of approaches to the study of Nigerian Government and Politics, as well as the basic features of pre-colonial, colonial and post-colonial systems of government

Objectives

The objectives of this course are: (i) explain the concepts of government and politics (ii) examine the pre-colonial political systems in Nigeria (iii) discuss the pattern of

British conquest and colonization of Nigeria (iv) identify the features, merits and demerits of British Colonial rule in Nigeria (v) highlight the series of constitutional development and Nationalist struggles in Nigeria (vi) examine the post-independence political developments in Nigeria.

Learning Outcome

Upon completion of these course, students should be able to: (i) explain the concept of government from its three major dimensions (ii) discuss the traditional political system of the pre-colonial kingdoms, empires, and societies in Nigeria (iii) elucidate the pattern of British conquest, and colonization of Nigeria (iv) examine the features, merits, and demerits of British indirect rule system in Nigeria (v) analyze in detail, the series of constitutional development, nationalists struggle and eventual granting of independence to Nigeria. (vi) comment on Nigeria's Post-independent experiences.

Course Contents:

Basic concepts of government and politics, pre-colonial political systems in Nigeria, pattern of British conquest and colonization of Nigeria, Indirect rule system in Nigeria, Merits and Demerits of Indirect rule, background to constitutional developments in Nigeria, Clifford constitution of 1992, Richard constitution of 1946, Macpherson constitution of 1951, Lyttleton constitution of 1954, Independent constitution of 1960, post independence Nigeria and the outbreak of Nigerian civil war, Post-civil war Nigeria.
