- Overview

American History and Diplomacy in the 19th and 20th centuries is designed to avail students, the opportunity to understand the background of American History since the exploration of the New World by Europeans at the end of the 15th Century. The course presents issues of conquest, colonization, and decimation of the indigenous society by Europeans, the development of the plantation system and the importation of African Slave labour; the independence of America and American influence through the growth of revolutionary movements. The course also exposes the students to the post-war reconstruction era, and American Diplomacy in the first and second world wars, and the eventual emergence of America as a super power nation.

Objectives

The objectives of this course are to: (i) Trace, the background of American History (ii) examine the exploration and Colonization of America by Europeans (iii) explain the American Revolutionary and Civil Wars (iv) identify the post-war reconstitution efforts in America (v) discuss American Diplomacy in the first and second world wars (vi) highlight on the factors that led to the emergence of America as a super power nation.

Learning Outcome

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to: (i) give a vivid account of the historical evolution of America (ii) comment on America's Colonial experience and the revolutionary wars that gave rise to American independence (iii) discuss in details the post-war reconstruction of America (iv) examine critically the principles that shaped America's diplomacy in the course of the first and second world wars (v) analyse the factors that aided America's emergence as a super power nation.

Course Contents:

Background to American History, European Exploration and Colonization of America, American Revolutionary wars, American independence, post-war reconstruction era, factors that shaped American Diplomacy, the rise of Big Business and Industry in America, American Diplomacy in the first world war, economic depression in America, the New Deal, Emergence of America as a Super power nation, American Diplomacy in the second world war, America in the post world war era.
